

Tell us about your foray into art.

I started making drawings when I was six years old though I didn't really understand art. An exploration about what it really means kept me going and intrigued me so much that I challenged myself. When I turned 12, I saw this incredible painting and it drove me crazy. That's when I realised that I would love to do this for real someday. So I just followed a little dream.

You are famed for using unconventional techniques. So what inspires your art?

I came out of school speaking a lot about my grandmother, not because she inspired my work, but because I simply used her as a reference for certain paintings. There are personal elements in my work—family, a photograph, a book or a memory that sparks an idea—but my work is not a narrative and deals more with the process, the subject specifically being oil painting. My plan has always been to maintain a balance between the history of painting and at the same time confront it. A painting doesn't necessarily need to be beautiful, you just need to find conversation between you and the object.

## What was the thought process that went behind the work exhibited in India?

Every painting that you see in the show is made with oil paint in a very unconventional way. People say that painting is dead and there's nothing new to bring to its history. So I wanted to stick to a fundamental medium and use it in a very unexpected way to create a conversation between painting methods. Everything is a big chunk of dry oil paint. I decided to start constructing interesting collages of dry paint but I wasn't sure of the imagery, so I went with the flow and decided to let the paintings surprise me. What unifies everything is that they are alternative oil paintings using a conservative

Why did you choose India as a location to showcase your work? What would you like to explore while in the country?

The most incredible thing about art I think is that it lets you travel and meet people. I thought this was an amazing opportunity to see how my work will be approached in a context like India. I want to explore the culture and catch a glimpse of the real thing while here. I want to walk around, see things and

get inspired. And I definitely want to visit the Elephanta Caves.

## Which is the one place in the world that inspires you?

I love meeting people, understanding cultures and finding ways of getting inspired no matter where I am. But I like Prague a lot. I lived there for several months during art school and it made a big impression on me. It doesn't have a big contemporary art scene but the romantic city blew me away. I did a lot of writing, reading and drawing while there and it opened up certain attitudes towards art in me.
